Mentoring: The Heart of My Retirement

Rediscovering Purpose in Retirement

When I retired several years ago, visions of travel, long afternoons with books and finally tackling home improvement projects filled my mind. Yet, it was something unexpected — and deeply meaningful — that would



come to define this chapter of my life: returning to my alma mater, Cal State Fullerton, not in body, but in spirit and purpose.

Mentoring Through Project LIFE and I Am First

Over the past five years, as a member of the OLLI Collaboration team, I have had the privilege of mentoring 72 students through two outstanding programs: Project LIFE", a partnership between OLLI-CSUF Collaboration and the CSUF Aging Studies Department's "Introduction to Gerontology" course and, more recently, the CSUF Alumni Association's "I Am First" Program. This program matches alumni mentors with first-generation college students navigating the final stretch of their academic journey at Cal State Fullerton.

Intergenerational Journeys and Mutual Growth

Each student I mentor brings unique energy, courage and determination. Many are trailblazers, the first in their families to attend college. Some balance multiple jobs, coursework and family responsibilities, all in pursuit of a brighter future. Our conversations span topics such as career planning, graduate school applications, wage negotiations, work-life balance and even retirement savings (yes, they are already thinking that far ahead!).

What astonishes me most is how quickly these mentoring sessions become two-way streets of learning. While I might offer advice and perspective, these remarkable students give me a glimpse into the passions, challenges and culture of a new generation.

Bill Sampson was elected Vice President - External Relations in April 2024 to serve a two-year term on OLLI's Board of Trustees.

As part of OLLI's promotional strategies, Bill coordinates OLLI's outreach programs, both to the Cal State Fullerton community and to the greater off-campus community at large: to familiarize them with OLLI and its mission and to recruit new members for OLLI. <u>Auditing CSUF Courses for Free</u> <u>An Often-Overlooked OLLI Benefit</u>

One of the most valuable OLLI benefits is the privilege to audit any Cal State Fullerton course, free of any tuition fees, with the instructor's permission and approval from the OLLI O ffice. OLLI members don't receive any official, academic credit from the University, but they enjoy the benefit of a world-class education, participating with university students.

CSUF's fall semester classes start on August 25, 2025, so if you want to audit a University class, you need to start the application process right away. You must enroll through OLLI.

The deadline to submit your application to the OLLI office is Friday, August 15.

Go to the OLLI website at http://olli.fullerton.edu and click on AUDITNG CLASSES for step-by-step instructions to enroll through the OLLI O ffice.

- The first step is to find courses of interest in the catalog. The OLLI webpage provides links to the CSUF course catalog and schedule of classes for each semester.
- The next step is to access the schedule of classes to find specific classes and their Zoom meeting times. Using CSUF's schedule of classes can be daunting, so

the OLLI website gives detailed instructions on how to navigate through it.

- You will be asked to complete a form, including your email address, and submit it to the OLLI Office at olli-info@fullerton.edu.
- The OLLI Office will obtain instructor approval to attend your course(s) of choice. If approved, you will receive confirmation from the instructor, and later, information on how to access the class.

Many instructors use CSUF's online learning management system, Canvas, to post handouts and assignments and communicate with their students. This system is also used to provide links to virtual classes. See OLLI's Auditing Classes webpage for more details.

OLLI members have found that when auditing CSUF courses, you really need to buy the books. Most, but not all, instructors will let you slide on homework and exams, but you may want to do the work in order to participate fully and gauge how well you are learning the material.

OLLI members have found also that they were encouraged to ask questions and participate in class discussions. This is good news — we all know OLLI members like to ask questions and offer their thoughts in class. I believe that OLLI members bring wisdom from their careers and life experiences that can add significantly to class discussions and benefit the young CSUF students.

Our members have found CSUF instructors to be insightful and their courses to be challenging. The books may not be cheap, but the value of this level of instruction goes way beyond the cost, especially when you consider you pay no tuition.

Collaboration Steering Committee Meeting 2025

The OLLI-CSUF Collaboration Program hosts an annual Collaboration Steering Committee meeting each year, attended by the associate deans from CSUF's nine colleges, the Deputy Provost of Academic Affairs, select CSUF partners, the OLLI Executive Director, 10 OLLI Board members and 10 Collaboration members, chaired by Sue Mullaly.

This year's meeting was held on Monday, June 30. The gathering provided an opportunity to renew or establish new partnerships while reviewing the Collaboration activities from July 2024 through June 2025. During this time, OLLI volunteers assisted more than 1,600 students and faculty members by contributing more than 2,000 hours of service.

Since its inception in January 2024, donations from OLLI members to CSUF's Student Basic Needs Program have included over 2,500 pounds of food (2,000 items) to the CSUF Pantry, 2,050 items of clothing to Tuffy's Career Closet, nearly 1,400 hygiene products to Basic Needs Services, and 160 packages of primarily craft supplies to the Children's Center.

The OLLI Collaboration partnership with CSUF offers numerous benefits to both OLLI's retired members and CSUF's students. It promotes a sense of purpose and well-being for our older adults while enriching students' educational experiences and career preparedness. Over the past 15 years, through meaningful intergenerational exchanges and various collaborative activities, the OLLI-CSUF Collaboration Program has had the privilege of supporting student success as a vibrant and supportive member of the university community.

A light lunch was followed by a breakout session with

CSUF attendees and OLLI members discussing new ways to enhance our intergenerational approach to supporting student success.

New Programs in the Fall Curriculum

These nine, new programs are included in the fall 2025 semester curriculum.

You can find the entire semester's class or event meeting schedules for these new programs in the Fall Blue Book and on the OLLI website (under Classes/Activities and under Calendars). Weekly meeting schedules are also available in the weekly Class Information and Updates Newsletters and the announcements display in the lobby of the Shapiro Wing.

Check the full program descriptions in the Blue Book or OLLI website for possible pre-registration or prerequisite requirements, and watch the newsletters in case there are last-minute schedule changes or meeting cancellations.

Shelf-Aware: Banned/ Challenged Books

Have you ever been curious about books which are challenged and banned? If so, please join us in this new course, called "Shelf-Aware," which will focus on some of our most beloved literary works. We'll learn details about the reasons behind these threatened publications. We will dive deeply, exploring and appreciating picture books, chapter books, young adult books and adult books. The instructor/coordinator is Andrea Tarr.

Learn to Play Recorder

Come join us to learn how to play the recorder. It is one of the easiest instruments to learn and play. Even if you have breathing issues, you will be able to produce music easily. And it is good for your health, too. (The NIH

has shown that playing an instrument can lower the risk of cognitive impairment.) The ability to read music is a plus, but not necessary. We will teach you. You can buy a very good recorder online for under \$15. You will also need to purchase the book *Essential Elements for Recorder* published by Hal Leonard Corporation. It is available online for about \$6. Other music will be provided. Get ready to experience the joy of making music!

If you know how to play, join us. In a short while, we will be playing all kinds of fun music—folk, popular, oldies and more. The instructor is Charlotte Lynch and the coordinator is Penny Bowman.

Spanish Conversation

This class will be offered to students who have a basic ability to communicate in Spanish and who want to improve their oral skills. While grammar, vocabulary and writing are provided in other classes, the objective of this class is to develop the most difficult aspect of a language, which is speaking without extensive preparation. Vocabulary, attention to pronunciation and usage of proper grammar will be expanded during this course. The class topics will be varied and include conversations about selected articles, movies, documentaries and themes in which students discuss their views and understanding in Spanish. Students may be assigned to groups to argue for or against an idea or concept. The instructors/coordinators are Suzi Attal and Lu Attal.

Italian Renaissance and Beyond: Venice

This course delves into various aspects of Italian civilization during the Renaissance and slightly beyond. It is interdisciplinary, integrating multiple disciplines such as history, visual arts, music, literature and government to provide a well-rounded picture of the era. The fall semester will focus on the Republic of Venice during its Golden Age, from the 1400s to 1600s. What made the Republic of Venice one of the most splendid cities of the European Renaissance? What contributed to its fall? Examples of Venetian documents provide extensive information about this fascinating city and enlighten us about how history is written. Through audio and visual material, we will learn about various events and trends discovering how they influenced other areas of life, resulting in "aha" moments for students as they make connections and understand how each aspect affects everything else. The instructor is Giulio Ongaro, and the coordinator is Cheryl Ongaro.

Artificial Intelligence (AI) Basics for the Curious

This course introduces OLLI members to the fastevolving world of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in an accessible and engaging format. Designed for learners across a range of tech confidence levels, the course explores where AI shows up in everyday life and where it's headed next. Topics include The basics of AI, Getting started with ChatGPT and voice assistants, Understanding AI's impact on privacy, creativity and ethical decisionmaking. Participants will also learn how to use AI tools for writing, researching, organizing etc. Each class includes a brief segment of hands-on implementation. Drawing from his teaching experience in OLLI tech courses and support roles in AI workshops, Danny Torres brings a hands-on, learner-friendly approach to the material. Special note: Participants are encouraged to bring an internet-connected device (smartphone, tablet, or laptop) for in-class practice, with campus access via SIM or the Eduroam Wi-Fi network. The instructor/coordinator is Danny Torres.



Cybersecurity Essentials for Seniors

Older adults are becoming increasingly vulnerable to cyberattacks, making them prime targets for various forms of online exploitation. In collaboration with CSUF's Orange County Cyber Innovation Clinic (OCCIC), OLLI members will learn practical skills to protect themselves and their devices (phones, tablets and computers). Specific threats such as phishing, vishing and smishing scams, financial fraud and malicious software will be discussed, and attendees will learn how to protect themselves. The interactive lecture and workshop will focus on these common cyber threats. Attendees will watch live demonstrations and participate in interactive exercises on their own devices to help them recognize these threats. Weaknesses will be identified, and highly rated products may be recommended to strengthen the device's security. This course is taught by CSUF industry-certified CSUF students and overseen by CSUF faculty. Register for both sessions using TouchNet so that adequate support

may be provided. See the weekly OLLI newsletters for more information. The instructors are OCCIC Industry-Certified CSUF Students, and the coordinators are Tom LaCasa, Roz Charles, Danny Torres and Paul Herrick.

It's Not Easy Being Green

Each class will focus on a case study of a proposed or completed green energy project. We will begin with a video and/or brief instructor presentation describing the project. The remainder of the class will be a group discussion of the issues and opportunities of the project from a wide variety of disciplines including underlying science, cost/benefits, "well to wheels" environmental impact (reviewing a project throughout its lifecycle),

technological viability, social acceptance and political impact. Some possible topics include: Rooftop and Grid Scale Solar Electricity Generation, Household and Grid Scale Energy Storage Using Batteries, Electrically Driven Cars/Trucks/Ships/Planes and Fresh Water



Generation From Desalination of Seawater. The instructor is Rick Hearn, and the coordinator is Susan Hanna.


Moses: An Unlikely Character

Historical proofs for Moses' existence and that of the Exodus have been elusive. In this course, we'll present the improbability that Moses was a historical figure. Instead, we'll explore Moses as an amalgam of folkloric influences and editorial strategies used to create the literary centerpiece of Israelite identity. To do so, we'll parse (deconstruct) the Moses narrative from within, introducing its historical, linguistic (but you need not know any Hebrew) and storyboard incongruities. We'll also address the story's external structure to establish that a figure internal to the narrative could not have authored it. Beyond folklore, the Moses story will be offered as

a wisdom tale that uses motifs standard in the ancient Near East; we'll investigate the ways in which the Moses story has been rewritten and repurposed to satisfy biblical and non-biblical agendas. Please pre-read the books of Exodus, Numbers and Deuteronomy. Bring a Bible (your choice, but a translation, not a summary interpretation), an open mind and a respect for others' views. The instructor is Dr. Craig Miller, and the coordinator is Dr. Ben Hubbard.

One God, Three Faiths: Jews, Christians and Muslims in Cooperation and Conflict

The aim is to present an objective account of how these three traditions have interacted throughout their histories. This course will analyze why relations among them have been positive in some eras and negative in others. It will help to clarify the misunderstandings and outright bigotry that have resulted in bias, hatred and persecution among them. This course will offer suggestions about how these three "children of Abraham" might improve relations, especially in America, to prevent anti-Semitism, hatred of Christians and Islamophobia. The instructor is Dr. Ben Hubbard, and the coordinatorand the coordinator is Jeanette Reese.

What's Happening at the Board

Following are highlights from OLLI's Board of Trustees meeting on July 10, 2025:

- Board officers are updating their official written procedures for each function they are responsible for.
- Possible new position of VP Development, focusing on fundraising, is being evaluated.
- Possible new position of VP Marketing and New Member Solicitation is being evaluated.
- Executive Director Daisy Thomas is meeting with her counterparts at OLLI at UCI and OLLI at Cal State Long Beach to discuss collaborations, such as trips.
- OLLI's Data Systems Engineer, Rishitha Bathini reported that the new TouchNet system is now programmed to handle new member registration, existing member renewals (including 90+members), trip and special event registrations and payments, and course fee payments. She noted the system now includes: husband and wife members can both register at the same time, ChroniCLE and Blue Book mailing fees and an option to opt out of OLLI's use of a member's likeness in photos or videos. Also, pictures or flyers for trips and events may be added to the registration page.
- A proposal is being evaluated to have new tech courses that are proposed by the Technology Education Committee submitted to the Curriculum Committee to conform with the requirements for all other new program proposals.
- The Transitions in Retirement Committee was authorized to solicit fees for sponsorship from outside profit and non-profit organizations to help fund OLLI's "Retirement Housing Choices Workshop and Resource Fair" scheduled for October 4.

The trip will take 13 days and 11 nights to cruise around the whole island and visit all the sights, including the cities of Taipei, Yilan, Taidong, Kaohsiung, Tainan, Miaoli, Hsinchu and Jiufen. We will visit the National Palace Museum, Fo Guang Shan Temple, the national parks of Taroko, Kenting, Alishan and Moon Lake. We will travel by high-speed trains and coach buses. We will learn the Atayal indigenous culture, see the whole beautiful island and eat delicious Taiwanese food. The activity level is 3 (of a maximum level 5), including many walks. If you need a wheelchair, you must bring one along and pay for a companion to assist you.
