Donna Spradlin's Reflections on OLLI

The Betty Robertson Award is granted each year by OLLI in memory of Betty Robertson, "The Godmother of OLLI," who tirelessly worked to create a program for continuous learning for seniors. The award is given to an older CSUF student

graduating with special recognition for their achievement and devotion to lifelong learning.

Donna Spradlin and her husband Kirt joined Continuing Learning Experience (CLE), the precursor to OLLI, in 2003. Kirt served as President and in a number of other offices. The bench at the Parking Lot J entrance to the Ruby Gerontology

Center (the OLLI buildings) was placed there in his memory. Donna was named Volunteer of the Year in 2009, a recognition system that did not continue after 2011. She and Kirt also originated the 90+ program. For this article, Donna shared her reflections on some events at CLE and OLLI over the years.

In 2004, CLE had its first Baseball Bash at Goodwin Field, the current home of the CSUF Titans baseball team. Dave Musante was able to get the coaches to agree to a date for the event. Tickets for hamburgers, hot dogs, chips, apples and drinks sold for \$10. Leo Shapiro, CLE's first president, threw out the first pitch. At first, OLLI members occupied the patio next to the VIP room at the top level of the stadium. Some years later, OLLI used the open air patio above third base. Dave and his friends put up tarps to protect our fans from the hot sun and the heat from the barbeques. Up until 2016, the OLLI President usually threw the first pitch, but in 2012 it was Donna's turn. The last Baseball Bash was scheduled for 2019. It ended at the request of the field's concessionaires.

Although the CLE board opposed joining Osher Lifelong Learning Institute, CSUF accepted a grant of one million dollars from the Bernard Osher Foundation, and in 2006 CLE became OLLI-CSUF, joining about 100 OLLIs across the U.S. At first, Donna and Kirt were upset, as Leo Shapiro was a close friend who helped found CLE, but they agreed that the decision to change our name and accept the \$1,000,000 was the best choice; we later received a second million from the Foundation which allowed OLLI to expand its programs.

Donna was also on the Trips Committee, which researched and planned trips, circulated the sign-up sheets and made signs for the trips. During the Hollywood Bowl concerts, Kirt and Donna left a little early and held up signs directing OLLI people to the bus.

Donna was also a member of the Hospitality Committee and created "event books" that could be used as a guide for later events. They including spreadsheets of expenses made by Marie Stiegler and photos taken by Kirt and printed by Donna.

The use of Zoom to hold classes was a revolutionary change for OLLI. Members like Donna are able to participate in OLLI classes even when they are unable to be there in pers This was a lifesaver for OLLI during the pandemic. Members who had moved away were able to continue "attending" their favorite classes.

When discussing how OLLI is doing today, Donna said she felt OLLI is still recovering from the effects of the pandemic, which resulted in a reduction in membership. In addition, older members have passed away or moved, and many of the local aerospace companies, such as Hughes, that were a source of retirees, are no longer around.

From CLE to OLLI-CSUF, our members' enthusiasm, energy and skills to lead the organization and their desire to teach classes and volunteer have been the keys to educational and enjoyable experiences.

Hundreds Attend Spring Preview to Learn More About OLLI

The courtyard and classrooms were packed on January 11 as new OLLI members, current members and others who were curious about what OLLI offers attended the Spring Preview held January 11.

OLLI President Vickie Hite welcomed the crowd by asking, "What's your passion? Chances are, we have a class that can help you develop that." She pointed out that this spring, 86 courses are offered in seven different categories as well as 14 special interest groups. New courses include "American Sign Language for All Ages," "Navigating Cancer: A Survivor's Perspective" and "Smart Money Moves: Expert Strategies for Financial Planning."

She also noted the upcoming OLLI trips including visits to the Academy Museum of Motion Pictures in Los Angeles, a "behind the scenes" tour of LAX and more. Plans are also underway for an international trip to Taiwan.

"The people in OLLI are interested in learning," said Robert Kovacev, Vice President Administration, who also addressed the crowd. "Retirement is one of the biggest changes in people's adult lives. At OLLI, you'll learn, discover new passions, develop new friendships and give back through mentoring programs that pair our members with students at Cal State

"What's especially great is that there are no exams, no term papers, no grades, no requirements," he continued. "You can even audit college courses (with instructor permission) and we'll help you do that."

During the morning hours, teachers of many of OLLI's classes staffed tables where visitors could inquire about courses, learn more about OLLI's many types of activities and get a preview of topics that might be addressed during the upcoming semester.

OLLI members Barbara Rosen and Britt Wachsman, coordinators of the "Eclectics" program that features different speakers on a variety of topics every other week, provided details on upcoming programs.

Carol Carson invited attendees to consider the "Drawing for the Fun of It" and "Watercolor Workshop" courses that are offered. "This is a supportive group and many of our students enjoy drawing and painting because it helps them reduce stress."

Dave Cortez and Ellie Page offer insight into how to become happier in the "Finding More Wisdom and Joy in Retirement" classes they offer. "We help members learn to live in peace and develop resilience to deal with life's challenges," David said.

Jim Medici was encouraging the members in the crowd to consider becoming a member of the Crescendo Chorale. "Don't worry if you can't sing well," he said. "We all have a lot of fun and enjoy each other."

Rayleen Williams was recruiting members for the Concert Band and Jazz Band. "We have lots of folks who haven't played an instrument since high school," she said. "Concert Band is a nice way to get back into playing. Although you may have forgotten how to play, it usually comes back pretty quickly."

Teachers of the various languages taught at OLLI (Spanish, French and German) also welcomed visitors, as did Dawn Wilson who is teaching the new sign language course this semester.

Following the auditorium program, attendees gathered for a luncheon of sandwiches, chips, fruit. vegetables and cake.

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Dr. Mackey's Auditorium

The Mackey Auditorium, the jewel of our Ruby Gerontology Center (RGC), was named after Dr. Francis "Bud" Mackey. Dr. Mackey made a major donation toward building the RGC, particularly intended for the auditorium, because he believed in the concept of the Continuing Learning Experience (CLE, the predecessor to OLLI) as a benefit to the senior community and Cal State Fullerton. Dr. Mackey also used his influence with the Orange County medical community to help fund the auditorium, and they raised \$350,000 in his name.

Mackey Auditorium was the result of Dr. Mackey's dream to build a state-of-the-art, multipurpose facility that could be used for general lectures, research and entertainment. He believed the auditorium would serve as a learning center and a social center for both the University and CLE/OLLI, and also benefit the medical community by supporting gerontological learning and research. It has been used extensively for these purposes over the years.

The 230-seat auditorium, which opened as part of the new RGC facility in August 1988, was designed as a high-technology theater/auditorium. The auditorium included state-of-the-art audio-visual display and videotaping capabilities. Originally, each seat included an audio outlet plus an audience response mechanism that was used for research and data acquisition, as well as aiding the audience in participating in discussions and Q&A. The audience response system did not survive over the years, but the auditorium has been continually updated with the latest audio-visual systems.


Dr. Mackey was one of Orange County's most renowned physicians. Originally from Warren, Ohio, he graduated from Ohio State University Medical School in 1943, then served in the Army Medical Corps during World War II. After the war, he moved to Fullerton and opened his internal medicine practice. He was the first cardiologist at St. Jude Medical Center, and when he retired from his cardiology practice, he became the Medical Director at St. Jude. He was the driving force in establishing the first inpatient rehabilitation center in

Orange County, which evolved into a model inpatient and outpatient facility at St. Jude for rehabilitation of stroke, orthopedic, cardiac and other conditions. He was also a pioneer in the development of the medical culture in Orange County. Dr. Mackey was named Physician of the Year by the Orange County Medical Association and Distinguished Physician of the Year by St. Jude.

After many years of ignoring his own doctor's suggestion to have routine tests for colon cancer, Dr. Mackey discovered he had it and made it his cause to promote early detection. He spoke at wellness forums and medical gatherings, preaching the value of tests like colonoscopy for those over 50, which he believed would have saved his own life and would ultimately save thousands of lives.

Dr. Mackey died in 2001 at the age of 84 of colon cancer, but not before he published a book about his own experience, from diagnosis to chemotherapy, titled "Why Die of Colon Cancer?" He self-published his book at a cost of \$57,000, because he feared he would die before he found a publisher.

Dr. Mackey's support of the RGC and CLE/OLLI established a connection between St. Jude and OLLI that remains today in the form of Dr. Joe Lawton's popular "Medical Series" classes, instructed by prominent doctors from around Southern California, many from St. Jude.

Following are highlights from OLLI's Board of Trustees meeting on January 9, 2025:

• Planning has begun for OLLI's annual Titans Day of Giving on March 12, adding networking to OLLI members' friends and family this year.



- Small Asks Program is being developed to increase members' volunteerism.
- Treasurer Ann Sparks has begun work with Board officers on the 2025-26 fiscal budget.
- The OLLI office has implemented the Touch Net system for members to pay all fees online and will soon implement the Sales Force system to enable the office to directly control all email contacts with members and member IDs.
- Purchase was approved for licensing fees to use the new Touch Net and Sales Force systems.

- Membership VP Debbie Maxwell reported that spring semester registration included 52 mid-year renewing members and 20 new members for a total membership of 1,114.
- Renee Cabrera reported on a new All Things Social Committee that is working on ideas to better organize, fund and publicize all social events.
- Debbie Maxwell reported on planning for the 45th Anniversary Celebration on February 14.
- Purchase was approved of a high-end computer for the OLLI office to enable the office staff to use advanced graphics software to produce both the ChroniCLE and Blue Book.
- The President, VP External Relations and Executive Director are evaluating the creation of a new committee to focus on marketing OLLI to the public.
- 90+ membership criteria will be revised to allow free membership sooner after the qualified member turns age 90.
- Sue Mullaly reported on OLLI Collaboration's volunteer results and donations to OLLI's Basic Needs Program over the previous year.
- The Volunteer Recognition Program recently recognized Ginger Barnhart, Melinda Wiltsie and Judy Alter.
