- Hat, sunscreen, water, possibly a small chair
- Take your time walking around to see what attracts your attention.
- Use your view finder to see what would be interesting to paint
 - How would you set up the scene?
 - "Vertical or horizontal
 - What is distracting?
 - Do you need to move where the ie. the tree is located?
- Keep it simple.
- Compose a scene by drawing a rough sketch starting with the big shapes first. Then transfer on your watercolor paper or watercolor block.
- Get comfortable and begin painting.
- Take your time, relax and enjoy.

Activity for today:

- Using your own picture or the ones provided choose which one you find most fun to paint.
- How will you set up the scene?
 - Vertical or horizontal?

- Delete what is unnecessary in the scene.
- Decide where your focal point is and how your eye is drawn to it.
- Plan where your lights, midtone and dark colors will be.
- Compose a scene by drawing a rough sketch starting with big shapes on your sketch paper.
- Transfer on your watercolor paper.
- Get comfortable and begin painting.
- Take your time, relax and enjoy!
