It's always hard to say farewell when friends move away, but saying goodbye to former OLLI President Joyce Ono and popular instructor Richard McCaman seems harder than usual as they prepare to move into their new home in Hawaii. Since joining our OLLI community twenty-some years ago,



Joyce and Richard have been active members, and their volunteerism has touched our lives and helped shape OLLI into what it is today.

For Joyce and Richard, being OLLI volunteers has brought them more than just the personal rewards that come with helping to make a difference or “giving back,” it has also enabled them to forge new friendships through collaboration. Joyce has strong feelings about that, “When you volunteer in an organization like OLLI, where you have opportunities to work with others in a collaborative, supportive way, you

create a cadre of friends who share a passion.” Building upon this sentiment, Richard said, “The collaborations that we have shared with our OLLI friends these past twenty years will always remain as our most rewarding and meaningful continuing learning experience.”

Joyce agreed, adding, “Volunteering—where you work closely with others for a common good—is an excellent way to create the social network that we all need to thrive as we age.”

Joyce’s and Richard’s volunteerism at OLLI has been guided in part by their own passions/interests and in part by the neuroscientific and biological expertise, computer knowledge and leadership skills that they developed during their careers in scientific research and teaching. Joyce’s and Richard’s careers have overlapped over the years, which has given the couple a shared framework of scientific knowledge, but each has his and her own areas of expertise.

Joyce worked in Richard’s neuroscience lab in the Beckman Research Institute at the City of Hope for her postdoctoral training before moving on to teach physiology, biology and neurobiology at Cal State Fullerton. When Joyce retired professor emeritus from Cal State Fullerton’s Biology Department in 2003, she made good on her personal vow to pursue art. She started off by attending the watercolor and drawing classes at CLE (renamed OLLI in 2006) and drawing classes at Cal State Fullerton. As Joyce built her artistic skills, she volunteered to fill teaching and coordinator vacancies that arose in OLLI’s “Watercolor Workshop” and “Drawing for the Fun of It” courses. Collaborating with other volunteers lightened the work for all concerned and allowed Joyce’s knowledge of painting and drawing to blossom further. Joyce said, “Teaching classes at OLLI that were in my areas of interest has been fun and rewarding because you always research your subject in order to present it and so you learn it well.”

Richard retired from the Beckman Research Institute in 1998 and became an adjunct lecturer at Cal State Fullerton’s Biology Department, where he taught computer classes and worked *Aloha, Joyce ... Continued on Page 6*

Reflections on OLLI: Charlotte “Char” Oliva

Char came to CLE, Continuing Learning Experience (OLLI-CSUF’s predecessor), after a rather exciting life.



She was born in Cateret, New Jersey, raised in Perth Amboy, graduated from PAHS in 1948, and graduated from Douglass College (Rutgers University) in 1952 with a B.A. in French Language/Literature. She

went on to be a Fulbright Scholar in Paris in 1952-53 and married Vincent Oliva in 1953.

Char and Vince moved to San Diego in 1957, then to Buena Park in 1963 and finally to Fullerton in 1973 with their growing family, four girls and one boy. Dr. Vincent Oliva was the Chief of Radiology at West Anaheim Community Hospital. He had served on the staff for 25 years. Char took a master’s degree in French language and literature at CSUF in 1982.

When asked how she became interested in CLE, Char laughed. “It was all her husband’s fault,” she said. Vince had retired early, in 1988 at 58 years young. Char was out delivering Meals on Wheels and was involved in other community activities. A neighbor had spoken about Betty Robertson and a program that was being developed over at the Mahr House. (Betty Robertson later became known as the Godmother of CLE ... and a best friend to Char.)

Vince was off the couch and joining friends at meetings. He loved Leo Shapiro, one of CLE’s founding members and CLE’s first president. Soon he was attending CLE programs every day. He became an opera lover. He could sit three hours without a break for an art about which he had known little. “He loved the music, the themes, the drama, the melodrama. Nothing got done in the house or the yard.”

Char became a coordinator for the CLECAT Club. Vince was so proud of her that he bought her a new computer.

It was only after her husband’s death, ten years

later, that Char began to get involved as a behind the scenes volunteer as secretary to the Board of Trustees. After Don Pease (CLE president from 1997 to 1999) and his wife left CLE, Char took over the In-Memoriam program, honoring CLE members who had passed away the prior year, and led it for 10 years.

It was difficult for Char to accept the change from CLE to OLLI in 2006. She had been on the ground floor of CLE development. She had to learn to embrace the new system, Osher Lifelong Learning Institute. With the encouragement of her friends Betty and Dave Musante (OLLI president from 2009 to 2011) she realized that OLLI would bring in more funding to help increase the size and strength of the organization. However, she insisted that our newsletter would be called the ChroniCLE, lest we forget our roots.

Char continued to work in the computer labs, learning about videos and videoing. She sang bass in the back row with the guys in the OLLI Chorale while Betty Robertson sang alto in the front row with the ladies. She has sold tickets at the front entrance of the Shapiro wing, giving information and chatting with her many friends on the way in and way out.

Tai Chi was one of her favorite classes for over ten years. She loved working out over on the Arboretum patio. Warren Wilson would bring the music, long recorded tapes of Oriental music to put one in the mood for the smooth moves made during the sessions.

Her 90th birthday celebration was Char’s latest delight, as she was, “escorted to the Shapiro wing at the 90+ Club Table of Honor by young sixtyish, sweet, solicitous Hospitality Committee members.”

Char’s advice to new OLLI members is, “Embrace all that looks to be the least bit interesting. Remember Vince, a medical man, who learned to tolerate and enjoy opera. Or myself, who learned to sing bass with the guys in the back row. Give yourself a chance, you may like it!”

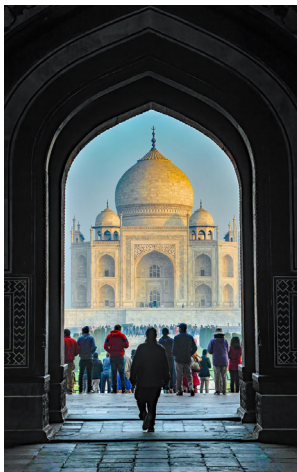

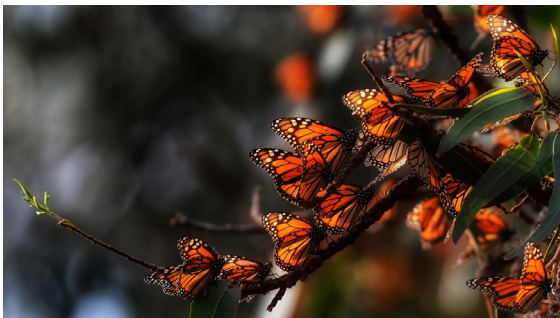

with computer science students on DNA databases for a number of years. He joined CLE soon after becoming an adjunct lecturer and when he eventually retired from teaching at the university, he began pursuing his interests in photography and genealogy at OLLI by collaborating with other members to start what are now known as the “Google Photos” and “Genealogy Research” courses. Richard introduced a popular Picasa curriculum for photo editing and presented useful Google apps for analyzing personal DNA results and building family trees. His most enjoyable experiences at OLLI have included exchanging ideas with class/group participants and witnessing the rise in their knowledge, skill sets, discoveries and accomplishments.

Careers help to mold and shape us. Joyce’s career honed her leadership skills, which she has put to use at OLLI by serving in a number of leadership positions. She has been a member of OLLI’s Computer Education Committee, Curriculum Committee, Nomination and Election Committee, and Policies and Procedures Committee. And, she has served on OLLI’s Board of Trustees as Trustee at Large, Vice President Programs, Vice President Communications, Vice President Administration and OLLI President.

Joyce’s tenure as OLLI President is particularly notable because it coincided with the onset of the COVID-19 Pandemic, which necessitated OLLI’s sudden and prolonged displacement from the Ruby Gerontology Center. To minimize the disruption to classes and committees and continue offering as much content as possible, Joyce collaborated with OLLI’s Board of Trustees, the information technology team, instructors, coordinators and committee members to transform OLLI’s class and committee formats from in-person to virtual. This feat required that everyone involved had to learn and install the new Zoom videoconferencing technology within a short period of time and then show other OLLI members how to use it. Joyce’s decisive leadership in this situation was crucial to keeping OLLI in operation.

Joyce has also taught at OLLI’s “Google Apps Workshops,” was a coordinator for the “Transitions

in Retirement Essentials” course, and together with Richard taught a Cell and Molecular Biology class for OLLI’s “Exploratory Discussion Group.”

Richard has drawn on his scientific and computer expertise to provide technical assistance and instruction at OLLI. He likens his efforts to “working in the background.” Among his many contributions, Richard has served on OLLI’s Computer Education Committee, instructed at “Google Apps Workshops,” been a co-coordinator for the “Boundaries of Science” course, and established the “OLLI Tech Help” in Room 20 where, once a week, OLLI members can bring their Windows personal computers and receive free help in updating their operating systems, remedying virus problems, repairing their hardware and more.

Joyce and Richard have done a lot for OLLI, and OLLI members have held farewell parties to let Joyce and Richard know how much their friendship and support have meant and how much they will be missed once they move away. The feeling has been mutual. Joyce and Richard are deeply appreciative of the affection and good wishes that they have received and will always cherish the friends they have made and the memories they have built as members of the OLLI community.

Lisbeth's work ethic and dedication have kept her reaching for her goals as family problems, mental health issues, the responsibilities of a single mother, and a full-time job weighed heavily on her shoulders. Her enthusiasm is still driving her commitment to creating positive change in the world.

Lisbeth's teachers and professors recognize her as a "passionate scholar who sincerely desires to help older adults through direct service and program implementation." They enthusiastically

recommend her and are "honored" by the opportunity to do so.

Lisbeth's children are 22, 20 and 15. What a wonderful example of a good life their mother has given them.

The two winners of the Aging Science Scholarships, funded through the OLLI Philanthropic Foundation, are undergraduates, Reilly Burns and Nora Mahmoud.

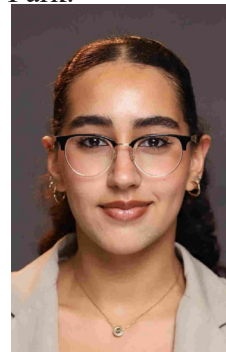
Reilly Burns' first year as a full-time student

Appointments to the OLLI Board

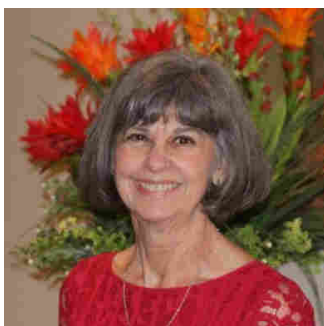

What's Happening at the Board

Following are highlights from OLLI's Board of Trustees meetings on May 9 and June 13, 2024:

- In the May meeting, newly elected OLLI President Vickie Hite presented her Priority Goals for the upcoming year: 1) Member recruitment and volunteer recruitment and retention; 2) Bringing back community and fun to OLLI; 3) Administering the 2024-25 budget; 4) Planning the Open House and 5) Celebrating OLLI's 45th anniversary.
- Phil Barnhard was reappointed as Parliamentarian for another year.
- Ann Sparks was appointed Treasurer.
- Annette Lauritzen was appointed Trustee at Large.
- A new ad hoc OLLI Volunteer Plan Committee was formed to expand the volunteer base, address volunteer burnout, promote volunteer recognition and advertise volunteer opportunities.
- VP Membership Debbie Maxwell formed the Lunch Brigade to sponsor events to

encourage members to get together over lunch in the RGC courtyard.

- VP Hospitality Lisa Sewell is seeking volunteers for the year's eight hospitality events.
- VP Administration Bob Kovacev and VP External Relations are co-chairing the ad hoc Membership and Revenue Committee to recruit and maintain members.
- Additional funds were approved to purchase equipment for Mackey Auditorium to record videos for OLLI's Distance Learning library.
- In the June meeting, accounting assistant, Ying Lu, resigned as of June 14 after seven years in the OLLI office. Recruiting has begun for her replacement.
- The first Lunch Brigade in the courtyard was successful, with 40 members in attendance, and more events will be scheduled.
- OLLI-CSUF Collaboration had their annual planning meeting with CSUF associate deans on June 24.
- A refresh of the OLLI website is planned to make it more appealing and user friendly.
- Thirty-one new members were registered for the summer session. OLLI's membership total is now 1,149.
- Inventories of printed materials are being reviewed and monitored to reduce future print quantities to eliminate waste.
- Procedures for trips and special events are being reviewed to determine how to use resources to assure they are not forced to be cancelled or lose money.
- A new Volunteer Recruitment and Retention Plan was approved to train volunteers, maintain a volunteer database, provide pop-up recognition events and follow up on volunteer interest submitted with members' online registration form.
- Standard, annual volunteer forms were sent out for all OLLI volunteers to complete. Next year they will be totally electronic.
- Fall Open House planning has begun.
- New CSUF President, Ron Rochon, will start on July 22.
- Lot J paving & upgrade will be announced shortly.
